Creamy Mac and Cheese Bake

The classic dish is a favorite comfort meal for all ages. This macaroni and cheese bake is made with gruyére and sharp cheddar cheese, but you can always personalize to your taste.

Ingredients

- · 8 oz elbow macaroni
- 3 tbsp butter
- · 1 tbsp flour
- · 2 cups milk
- 2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- · 2 cups shredded gruyére cheese
- ½ tsp salt

- ¼ tsp pepper
- ½ cup sour cream
- · 1 cup panko crumbs (plain or seasoned)
- ½ cup parmesan cheese
- 2 tbsp melted butter for panko crumb topping
- ½ tsp paprika



- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. Cook macaroni noodles in boiling water. Once noodles are cooked al dente, use a strainer to drain.
- 3. Melt 3 tbsp butter over medium heat in a saucepan. Stir in flour and whisk until bubbly. Add milk, salt, pepper and continue stirring often until the mixture comes to a boil and thickens. Add sour cream and stir until melted. Add shredded cheddar and gruyére cheese and continue stirring until melted into a thick cheese sauce.
- 4. Mix macaroni and cheese sauce together in one pan, then transfer to a lightly greased 8x8 baking dish.
- 5. In a medium bowl, combine panko crumbs, parmesan cheese, 2 tbsp melted butter, and ½ tsp paprika. Sprinkle mixture over macaroni and cheese, spreading evenly. Bake for 30 minutes (or until bubbly) uncovered. Let stand for 5 minutes before serving.

Note: For cheese to melt properly, it's best to shred your own cheese from a block and avoid using pre-shredded cheese. SESSION PROPERTY

THEY FILL OUR NEED FOR AFFECTION. Okay, not all cats are snuggly—but most are! And who can't benefit from a little cuddling every day? My cat snuggles next to me and quietly purrs while I read. It's true bliss! Tip: Don't worry if your new cat doesn't snuggle at first. Simply provide it with gentleness and non-intrusive affection, and it likely will gain trust and become a cuddler.

THEY'RE GOOD FOR OUR HEALTH: Many studies have shown that the bond with a pet can lower blood pressure, alleviate loneliness and lessen anxiety, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

THEY'RE LOW-MAINTENANCE: Cats are famously clean, forever bathing themselves and tidying up their box after using it. And unlike dogs, they don't require multiple daily walks. They're usually just content to hang out in the same room as their "person."

THEY PROVIDE STRUCTURE: Taking care of a cat's daily need—to be fed, watered and have their box cleaned—can add a routine, and a sense of purpose, to the day. Tip: If bending down is an issue, there are even automated, self-scooping litter boxes on the market.

THEY'RE INDEPENDENT: Cats can stay alone for a couple days if you need to go out of town. (Though please have someone look in on your kitty, as cats do get lonely).

THEY'RE MORE WIDELY ACCEPTED: Apartments and assisted living facilities are more likely to allow residents to own cats versus dogs, so if you live in such a place or think you might in the future, a cat is the wiser choice.

THEY CAN ENTERTAIN THEMSELVES: But a senior can also get some exercise by "playing" with their cat. My cat loves to bat at a tweety bird attached by string to a wand that I hold. We "play" once a day, because my cat clearly loves it. If you have mobility issues, cats are also easily entertained by stationary activities, like chasing a laser pointer.


Amy has been the photographer for this publication and she has been enjoying that work.



FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER

ext year will mark 20 years of service for the Athens-Limestone Family Resource Center. Executive Director Emmett Moore has been at the helm for nine months. During our conversation, he shared about the founding of the organization.

"A group of community members realized that there were some needs in the community, some people who were struggling and needed help. They got together and formed this organization. It has done nothing but grow since 2004," said Moore.

A veteran, Moore has served in the nonprofit world for many years.

"I've been in the nonprofit sector for 25 years, ever since I left the military. I started with Big Brothers and Big Sisters. I was with them for over 20 years in four different locations, Chicago, Atlanta, Columbus (Georgia), and Huntsville, Alabama. I tried corporate for a few years, but my wife told me I belonged working with nonprofit organizations and I felt the same way," said Moore.

Moore believes there are some keys to success when it comes to getting assistance from the Athens-Limestone Family Resource Center.

"First, know that you can be helped. Next, be willing to accept the help that's being given to you. One must also be open to receiving some direction and mentoring. Accepting help may seem like an easy thing to do, but it's really tough for a lot of people. When they come in, they need to not feel threatened and know that these are people who really want to help them," said Moore.

Those who come to the Athens-Limestone Family Resource Center for help will find a team willing to help with skills.

"We are definitely in the business of teaching people to fish.

That means we are willing to meet people halfway and we are willing to acknowledge the situations that they've been in," said Moore.

The Athens-Limestone Family Resource Center is made up of a team of special people.

"I look for people who have compassion on those who come through the door. It can't be people who look down on people when they come in. We want to see people who come through our doors as people who need help. It's a hospital, if you will, and we are trying to help the sick. In addition to that, our team members have to be strong people and people with thick skin because the people that come in are hurting," said Moore.

compassionate and understanding with those whom they serve.

"We can all look back on our own life experiences and help us remember where we've been. That allows us to be even more compassionate toward those who come through the

> door. I've had my ups and downs as well. I can look at dark times in my life like my daughter passing away at a very young age. That's a dark time that I have to reach back and remember when I am serving people who are here,"

said Moore

his time of year I am constantly asked: "What can I do to keep more of my hard-earned money?" and "how do I keep money in my business so it can continue to grow?". I want to share some tips for reducing how much you spend on taxes now and in the future.

FOR INDIVIDUALS:

UTILIZE AN HEALTH SAVINGS ACCOUNT

—Healthcare costs can get expensive. Fortunately, an HSA can reduce taxes if your plan qualifies. The limits for 2023 are \$7,750 for a family or \$3,850 for self-only. Your contributions are tax-free; the funds grow tax-free, and you can spend them on health expenses tax-free! It's a triple win

CHECK FOR FLEXIBLE SPENDING ACCOUNTS AT WORK

—A dependent care FSA allows you to use pre-tax dollars to pay for qualified out-of-pocket dependent care expenses such as daycare, summer camps, and before and after school care. Those who do not qualify for an HSA may qualify for a health care FSA. This account allows pre-tax dollars to pay for eligible medical, dental, and vision expenses.

ALABAMA'S 529 SAVINGS PLAN CONTRIBUTIONS

Alabama allows a tax deduction for contributions to the Alabama 529 Savings Plan. This deduction is limited to \$5,000 per taxpayer (\$10,000 for Married filing Joint). You can even rollover funds from another state's 529 plan to get this deduction.

ENERGY TAX CREDITS HAVE INCREASED

The amounts and limits for home energy tax credits changed favorably at the beginning of 2023. Examples of items that qualify for the credit are new doors, windows, heat pumps, and home energy audits. There are also changes to the electric vehicle credit that allows up to \$7,500 for plug-in electric vehicles.

FOR BUSINESSES:

SELF-EMPLOYED HEALTH INSURANCE

Health insurance is expensive and when you're self-employed it is even more costly. Taking advantage of the self-employed health insurance deduction is a great way to reduce your income taxes. Deduct 100% of insurance premiums up to your net income for health, dental, vision, and long-term care for everyone on your plan. This includes your spouse and family!

RETIREMENT PLANNING

Being self-employed means it is up to you to save for retirement. Being self-employed also means you can put back significantly more to retirement than you can as an employee. For 2023 you can contribute up to \$66,000 to a SEP IRA or 401(k).

PAYING CHILDREN WHO WORK IN THE BUSINESS

If you have a child who helps with your business, ensure you are paying them wages on a W-2. In doing so, you will be able to deduct the wages you pay to them from your business income. There may also be exemptions for FICA and unemployment taxes. Any wages under the standard deduction will have no federal income taxes due.
